I. SAINT PETER, APOSTLE AND MARTYR^{CO}

called by Christ about A.D. 30; first bishop of Antioch

named in Scripture: "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church" (Matthew 16:18); at Antioch (Galatians 2:11)

This line of apostolic succession extends from the Apostle Peter, about A.D. 30, to the present day, a span of 1,996 years as of 2026.

The succession from St. Peter to Cyril VIII, Patriarch of Antioch, follows the list of the patriarchs of Antioch kept by the Church of Antioch, and from 1724 the list kept by the Melkite Greek Catholic Church: the same lists by which those Churches trace their own apostolic succession to St. Peter, first bishop of Antioch.

Consecrations to the office of bishop were made, one to the next, through the churches named below.

Some bishops in this line are also honored as saints. The marks beside their names concern holiness of life only. They do not bear on the validity of any consecration: every bishop listed holds his place in the succession equally, whether or not he is honored as a saint.

St. Saint: one whom a Church publicly honors as having lived a life of heroic holiness and as now being with God, and whose memory it keeps in its calendar. In the early Church saints were recognized by the acclaim of the faithful and their bishops; later, by formal

canonization in the Roman Catholic Church and glorification in the Eastern Orthodox Church.

Bl. Blessed: in the Roman Catholic Church, one who has been beatified, the formal step that precedes canonization as a saint.

C Honored as a saint or blessed by the Roman Catholic Church.

O Honored as a saint by the Eastern Orthodox Church.

CO Honored as a saint by both the Roman Catholic and the Eastern Orthodox Churches.

Red Martyr: one who gave his life for the faith.

The Churches do not always agree on who is a saint. One may honor a person whom another does not, and the marks show which Church honors each.

ANTIOCH

The see of Antioch, where “the disciples were called Christians first” (Acts 11:26), founded by St. Peter before he went to Rome. The bishops and patriarchs of Antioch from St. Evodius, who succeeded St. Peter, to Cyril V, as the Church of Antioch keeps their list.
